
Opinion, Fact, or Untrue Statements



Self checking cards for grades 5th thru 7th with an option for digital use with Easel by TPT.



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These task cards were made to build the skill of distinguishing when a statement is an opinion, fact, or untruth. This is a critical skill for students to develop since they get bombarded everyday with information that is not always correct, although it is presented as the truth. It is especially pertinent when our students become voters. Students will also learn some interesting facts and myths they may not be aware of.

Students in the upper elementary to 8th grade levels will do best with these cards. They are primarily at a 5th to 7th grade reading level. A slide/page of terms is included in the packet for review before assigning the packet.

The packet consists of 10 pages of 3 inch by 3 inch cards for a total of 30 cards. There is a true statement, untrue statement, and opinion statement on each card for students to identify. After students read the sentences on one side and identify them, they can be flipped to see the corresponding answers.

To make flip cards, print the sheets on cardstock so they are durable. The cards are constructed side by side, front and back. Three statements are on the left side and their answers are on the right side. Cut the horizontal lines and leave the vertical lines intact. Fold on the vertical line and fold the right side under the left side. They can be laminated or glued shut.

The cards can be used for small independent group activities or they can be projected up on a screen for a class quiz activity. Student's can compete against each other to earn points for correct answers.

Cards can also be assigned using The TPT Easel Activity. This platform makes them available for digital and distant learning. It provides teachers and students multiple options such as blocking answers with text box. Students can write or type answers into that area. Unblocked sheets with the answers can be provided later.

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Opinion

- Opinions are statements of individual belief, attitude, value, judgment, or feeling.
- Opinions often use judgement words such as very, best, worst, most, or greatest. Often the words, are all inclusive or exclusive which means you need to know additional information to make a judgement.
- Predictions often seem like facts but are opinions. Although they are often given by experts, they are not a fact until they happen.
- Statements that use ought to, could, and should, give advice and are an opinion even though the advice given may be based on a fact.

Fact

It can be confirmed by evidence and scientific research. It is not debatable.

Untrue/False/Fiction

Statements that can not be confirmed by evidence.
